Books, it's easy to forget you're

Addifferent approach, European villages or places that only exist in storybooks, it's easy to forget you're in Central Florida. One Disney dining destination, however, takes a deliberately different approach, staying as close to home as possible.

"Local" is a primary pillar of the culinary experience at The Wave...of American Flavors at Disney's Contemporary Resort, where Chef de Cuisine Frank Brough and his team source produce and proteins from a trusted network of small farmers in Florida and the southeastern United States. Disney Files Magazine Editor Ryan March sat down with Chef Frank to learn more about the restaurant's fresh culinary point of view.

Ryan: I understand that local sourcing is one of your restaurant's four key principles. I'd love to hear more about these.

Chef Frank: Absolutely. The first, as you mentioned, is local and regional sourcing. We just think we get can a lot better product in terms of freshness and quality by staying as local as possible, and we take great pride in supporting our local farmers.

The next is sustainable seafood. We use the Monterrey Bay Aguarium Seafood Watch program as a guide to help us identify seafood that can exist over the long term without compromising species' survival or the health of the surrounding ecosystem. We encourage Guests to seek sustainable seafood wherever they dine, and the Monterrey Bay Aquarium Seafood Watch program offers a free [Apple/iOS and Android] mobile app that makes it easy.

Third, we're committed to creating healthy dining choices. That begins with portion sizes, with our proteins typically presented in 6 oz. servings, as opposed to the 8-, 10- or 12-oz. portions you may be accustomed to seeing. We strive to compose well-balanced entrees that focus, not only on proteins that are free of antibiotics, steroids and hormones, but also on fresh vegetables and starches.

And finally, we focus on having a great beverage program. We serve coffee from fairtrade-sourced, shade-friendly (eliminating the need to clear-cut rainforests), organically raised beans (imported but ultimately roasted in nearby Tampa, Fla. and ground at the restaurant); vodka and beer organically produced right here in Central Florida; anti-oxidant cocktail mixers and smoothies; and a larger selection of Stelvin wines [which have screw-cap enclosures to prevent air from impacting the quality of the wine] than any restaurant in the United States.

Ryan: Members who visit The Wave frequently know that the menu changes seasonally. How do you approach seasonality here in a state not really known for having distinct seasons?

Chef Frank: We basically have three seasons instead of four, so I change the menu here three times a year. We have a fall/winter season, a spring season and then summer. We feature a lot of tropical fruit during the summer, from dragon fruit to Asian pears to watermelon, and we also feature Florida avocados, which generally become available in June. Sweet corn is a good example of a local crop with two seasons, as it's typically available in October and November, and then again March through May.

Beyond produce, government regulations mandate which fish can be harvested at various times a year, so seasonality impacts our menu's featured seafood as well.





Ryan: As this is our winter magazine, let's talk a bit about your menu's winter offerings.

Chef Frank: Florida winters are all about fabulous citrus, beginning in November with grapefruit season, closely followed by orange season. We source fruit from the only organic citrus grower in Florida. Strawberry season begins around Thanksgiving and can run as late as May. We even present a special strawberry dinner as one of our restaurant's monthly Farmer/Chef Dinner events through the Tables in Wonderland program.

Ryan: I'm intrigued by the idea of a strawberry dinner.

Chef Frank: It's a wonderful, seven-course dinner event that typically takes place in March or April. We use strawberries in each course, beginning with a strawberry tasting that's very similar to a wine tasting. A great farmer who develops new strawberries for the University of Florida presents five distinctively different varieties of strawberries, and Guests are always surprised by the differences.

Ryan: You're clearly passionate about the relationships you've formed with farmers.

Chef Frank: They're what I love most about my job - the relationships we form, not only with farmers, but with the families we serve. Our commitment to cooking with integrity, supporting local farmers and catering to the individual needs of families is enormously impactful. We've had families with unique dietary or nutrition needs tell us that we've given them their first dinner together in a restaurant. We're tremendously proud of that, and it's part of what makes this such a special place to work.

Tasty tribute

While winters at The Wave may be all about citrus, the holiday season upstairs in the resort's Grand Canyon Concourse is all about gingerbread. *Disney Files* Magazine caught up with Pastry Chef Jeff Barnes to learn more about the resort's gingerbread display, part of a holiday tradition that also extends to Disney's Beach Club Resort and Disney's Grand Floridian Resort & Spa.

"It takes thousands of pounds of gingerbread to create our display," Jeff said. "It starts with a European honey dough that we begin making in June before eventually adding the finishing ingredients to create the gingerbread. By the time we're done, we'll have baked more than 2,000 individual pieces to build the display."

The gingerbread building's familiar "it's a small world" theme celebrates Disney Legend Mary Blair, the visionary artist behind the classic Theme Park attraction and the towering tile mural that rises just behind the display at the heart of the concourse.

"Last year, we served more than 2,500 gingerbread cookies [near the display], all baked fresh daily," Jeff said. "The hidden-Mickey 'shingles' are always particularly popular, as are the interactive gingerbread-boy-decorating activities. We're excited about some new designs on the cookies we're serving. One features an image of the monorail with children from 'it's a small world,' while the other features the famed five-legged goat from the tile mural that towers behind our display. They're tasty little tributes to the great Mary Blair."





Taking the LEED: Aulani, a Disney Resort & Spa, Ko Olina, Hawai'i, recently became the first resort in Hawai'i to obtain LEED Silver certification through the U.S. Green Building Council for implementing environmentally friendly construction practices and building systems. Harvesting heat emitted from building chillers to generate hot water and providing electric-car charging stations for plug-in vehicles are among the resort's numerous environmentally friendly practices.

"In keeping with the rest of the resort, we integrated Hawaiian culture, stories and artistry into the design of the new pool area and restaurant to create an inspiring new environment," said Jeanette Lomboy, executive

"It's always nice to return 'home' to the bounty of the four Florida Parks," they said.


So what are they going to do next?

Visit Spoonful.com for more fun ideas designed to inspire your family to make...every day!

MAKES: 2 Olaf desserts

STUFF:

- 1. White candy melts (about half of a standard 12 oz. bag)
- 2. Chocolate candy melts (8 pieces)
- 3. Pretzel sticks (for arms)
- 4. Orange Starburst candies (1 per snowman)
- 5. Small candy eyes (available where novelty baking goods are sold)
- 6. Milk chocolate Hershey Kiss candies or chocolate chips
- 7. Edible food pens (likely available where you found those eyes)
- 8. Plastic squeeze bottle
- 9. A small (and clean) craft/food brush
- 10. Parchment paper
- 11. Vanilla ice cream (you'll need two scoops per snowman)

STEPS:

- 1. Tape parchment paper to your flat work surface so it won't move. If you're using chocolate Kisses for the buttons, use a knife to (carefully) shave down the sides.
- 2. Unwrap an orange Starburst and set it on the wrapper. Heat it in the microwave for 7 seconds. Allow it to cool for 15 seconds or until cool enough to handle. Mold it into the shape of Olaf's carrot nose using your fingers. Set aside.
- 3. Using a knife, splinter a few pretzel sticks to create Olaf's hair.
- 4. Heat white candy melts in a microwave-safe bowl on 40 percent power for 25 seconds at a time until the candy is melted. Stir and pour or spoon it into squeeze bottle, and put the top back on the bottle.
- 5. Squeeze out the white candy onto the parchment paper in the shape of Olaf's head. Use food brush to smooth out.
- 6. Use the edible blue and black pens to draw the outline of Olaf's eyes onto his face. (These circles should be just slightly larger than the size of the candy eyes you'll put in place as part of the next step.)



- 7. Squeeze out a second layer of candy over the top half of Olaf's head, creating a 3D effect. Use brush to smooth, then place the eyes, and 2-3 pretzel-sliver hairs.
- 8. Now squeeze out more melted candy under the eyes before placing his nose just under and between his eyes. Squeeze out more melted candy around the nose to keep it in place, using the brush to smooth. Allow candy to dry.
- 9. For the detail work, melt the chocolate candy melts in a small microwave safe bowl on 40 percent power for 45 seconds. Stir the candy until smooth. Clean and dry your food brush, and then use it to paint on Olaf's mouth using the melted chocolate candy. Allow time to dry.
- 10. Clean and dry the food brush. Open the squeeze bottle and dip your brush into the white candy. Paint Olaf's tooth in the top center of the mouth. Allow time to dry.
- 11. Stack two scoops of vanilla ice cream in a serving bowl, and give Olaf three Hershey Kiss or chocolate chip buttons, and two pretzel stick arms. Peel Olaf's head from the parchment paper and stick it on top of the ice cream. Serve immediately.

Sautéed Shrimp with Feta Cheese

As Members enjoy their first stays at the newest resort in the Disney Vacation Club neighborhood, the *Disney Files* staff heads to Citricos at Disney's Grand Floridian Resort & Spa, which recently added new tapas options to its world-class menu. The new items range from a hardwood-grilled Berkshire Pork Belly to a European Artisanal Cheese Selection to our favorite – the Sautéed Shrimp with Feta Cheese. Here, for your at-home enjoyment, is the recipe for this standout dish.

Serves: 4-6

Ingredients:

20 large shrimp, peeled and deveined 8 plum tomatoes
1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
1/4 cup thinly sliced garlic (about 5 large cloves)
1 cup chardonnay or other dry white wine
1/4 cup fresh lemon juice
1 cup diced feta cheese
1 stick butter, cut into pieces and softened
2 tablespoons freshly chopped cilantro
Coarse salt and ground black pepper to taste



Steps:

- 1. Cut shrimp in half lengthwise.
- 2. Remove and discard stem end from tomatoes, and cut the remaining portions of the tomatoes into large-bite pieces.
- 3. Heat oil in a large sauté pan over medium-high heat. Add garlic and cook until golden brown, about 1 minute.
- 4. Add tomatoes and cook for 2-3 minutes or until softened. Add wine and lemon juice, and simmer 3-4 minutes or until slightly reduced.
- 5. Reduce to medium heat. Add shrimp and feta cheese, stirring gently to combine, being careful not to break up the feta. Simmer 3 minutes or until sauce is thickened slightly and shrimp is cooked through.
- 6. Add butter and stir gently until it's melted into the sauce. Add cilantro, then salt and pepper to taste.
- 7. Toss, serve and enjoy.

Getting the swing of it

Designing the Seven Dwarfs Mine Train

Walt Disney World Resort: While piloting pachyderms, storming barns, venturing under the sea and dining like enchanted royalty are among the high-profile pursuits of visitors to New Fantasyland, a more quietly investigative activity is engaging a growing number of Magic Kingdom Guests – peering through a construction-wall window.

Beyond that narrow – and deliberately placed – portal are the inner workings of the Seven Dwarfs Mine Train, a family friendly, coasterstyle attraction that'll begin exploring the mine "where a million diamonds shine" in 2014. As the buzz surrounding the attraction's innovative ride vehicles continues to "dwarf" any in recent memory, *Disney Files* Magazine sat down with two of the project's leaders to get the inside scoop.

"We based our ride-vehicle concept on the swaying design of actual mine cars," said Ride & Show Engineering Senior Project Engineer Bob Vignec. "This is going to give Guests the sensation of gently gliding through every twist and turn, adding a thrill that's very different from a traditional coaster. We went through several iterations of the design, creating a variety of full-size, 'rideable' mockups to develop the ideal range of movement."

The final design features a finely tuned 'swinging profile' that'll keep the motion from being too wild or erratic, creating a thrill that aims to be as enjoyable to kids as it is to their



parents and grandparents.

"Most people think of engineering as boring, buttoned-up math," Bob added. "But we're doing things on this project that are really unique, so from an engineering standpoint, we've had to be creative in solving challenges we've never encountered. For an engineer, that's a lot of fun."

Intent on making the vehicles as attractive as they are innovative, Imagineers took special care to uphold the storied legacy of their source material.

"Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs is an extraordinarily detailed film, and it provided endless inspiration," said Dave Minichiello, Creative Development Director for Walt Disney Imagineering. "After studying the animated mine cars in the film and actual mine cars of the time period, we knew we wanted our vehicles to have that handcrafted look. So we had a craftsman actually hand carve the vehicle in wood, and we used that amazing carving to cast our train cars."

The team paid equal attention to the vehicles' visual details, from the hand-hammered quality of metal strapping to the flickering candlelight of onboard lanterns. The resulting trains are, like the attraction itself, designed to look great from every angle.

"The attraction is uniquely positioned to be viewed from more angles than any other Walt Disney World coaster," Dave added. "We're really excited about that, as it's going to be a stunning centerpiece for New Fantasyland."





Disneyland Resort: The holidays are a carousel of color at Disney California Adventure Park, where the enormously popular World of Color nighttime spectacular has become World of Color - Winter Dreams, an all-new show celebrating the season through Jan. 6, 2014.

Hosted by Olaf the snowman from the new Walt Disney Animation Studios film *Frozen*, the festive production combines new animation with classic winter scenes from such beloved Disney and Disney·Pixar films as *Bambi*, *Fantasia* and *Toy Story*, along with new special effects.

Winter Dreams represents the most sweeping re-imagination to date for the World of Color experience, which since its 2010 debut has introduced a variety of new segments featuring everything from legacy-leaving light cycles and pirates *On Stranger Tides* to a boldly *Brave* heroine and professionally "prepped" Christmas elves.

"The World of Color system was purposely built to be able to tell stories in so many different ways and to be able to constantly change and adapt," Walt Disney Imagineering Creative Entertainment Show Producer Sayre Wiseman told *Disney Files* Magazine. "In creating this allnew show, we faced the daunting challenge of getting everything programmed and ready while

at the same time running the existing World of Color show nightly. That we were able to do so during limited overnight hours is really a tribute to the system's original design."

While programmed during those late-night hours in Anaheim, the show represents a truly global effort, with music recorded in England's famed Abbey Road Studios and a new song performed by what's known as a "virtual choir," creatively conducted by Grammy Award winner Eric Whitacre by weaving together individual vocal performances from some of Eric's choir members around the world, as well as Disneyland Annual Passholders.

"This has been such an exciting project," said Sayre, who pointed to the *Toy Story* gang's fresh take on *The Nutcracker* and Thumper's classic moment with Bambi on ice as being among her personal favorite moments in the new show. "I grew up watching Sunday night's 'Wonderful World of Color' hosted by Walt Disney, and those memories are still with me. I hope that what we continue to create through our World of Color productions will be as well loved and cherished by our Guests as they were for me so many years ago. These stories are really part of our lives, and with shows like Winter Dreams, we strive to give them a place to thrive."

A complex return to 'simpler' cinema

Worlds collide in new theatrical short

Hollywood's leading mouse is going back to where his illustrious career began - an animated short on the silver screen.

Titled "Get A Horse!" and galloping into U.S. theaters on Nov. 27 with the Walt Disney Animation Studios feature *Frozen* (detailed in the fall edition of *Disney Files* Magazine), the innovative short returns Mickey to his squashing, stretching roots in an envelope-pushing blend of hand-drawn 2D and computer-generated 3D

animation. *Disney Files* Magazine sat down with Director Lauren MacMullan and Producer Dorothy McKim to learn more about the film, which has dazzled critics and audiences alike at such prestigious venues as the Annecy International Film Festival in France and the Telluride Film Festival in Colorado.

"The Mickey I love most is that young whippersnapper in the blackand-white age of Ub Iwerks, when the animation was so fresh and loose, and when Mickey was less

man and more mouse," Lauren told us as she recalled her original pitch to Disney and Pixar Chief Creative Officer John Lasseter. "I just love that era. It was a simpler time with fewer rules, when Mickey could stretch his rubber-hose arms and when villains didn't have tragic childhoods. That's the era that inspired the idea of making this film in the style of a lost short."

Created through a storied shorts program aimed at developing emerging animation directors and technologies, the film begins with new-but-cleverly-aged sequences (complete with intentional flickers, paint mistakes and various forms of "film damage") that call to mind such classics as 1928's "The Gallopin' Gaucho," with Mickey on a mission to rescue Minnie from



angry abductor Peg Leg Pete. When the frantic pursuit propels Mickey through the flickering screen and into our modern theater, he must find a way to get back into that black-and-white world to save the day.

While the sensibilities may be simple, the production was anything but.

"The really fun challenge of this production was that complex combination of 2D and 3D, color and black-and-white, newly recorded

audio [part of which artists performed with slide whistles, harmonicas and other old-school tools of the trade] and sounds from 85 years ago, sometimes all on screen together at the same time," Lauren said.

Among the 85-year-old audio used in the film is remixed dialogue that allowed producers to cast the ultimate A-lister in the leading voice role.

"Mickey's voice in the short is 100 percent Walt Disney," Dorothy said proudly, explaining that the team carefully blended dialogue pulled from

the first decade of shorts in which Walt voiced his animated alter-ego, sometimes spending weeks to mix a single word. "This also allowed us to cast the late Marcellite Garner as Minnie and Billy Bletcher as Pete."

Lauren embraced the creative casting, saying, "The minute we started pulling that Walt dialogue into the film, we realized how truly synonymous he is with early Mickey."

Unlike the similarly nostalgic Mickey shorts now engaging fans online, on television and on their phones, "Get A Horse!" is a quintessentially big-screen experience.

"As part of the action essentially takes place in your auditorium," Lauren said, "this film is tailor-made for theaters."

Saving the tapes behind SAVING MR. BANKS

"Lost" treasures aid new feature film

Scheduled to open in U.S. theaters on Dec. 20, the highly anticipated *Saving Mr. Banks* explores the extraordinary true story of how *Mary Poppins* made it to the screen – and the testy relationship Walt Disney had with author P.L. Travers that almost derailed the project.

The film finds Walt continuing a 20-year quest to turn P.L. Travers' *Mary Poppins* books into a movie. While the curmudgeonly Travers has consistently resisted (fearing that her beloved nanny would get mauled by the Hollywood machine), financial trouble moves her to reluctantly agree to travel from her London home to Disney's California studio to hear Walt's proposed plans and to consider selling the rights. For those two short weeks in 1961, Walt pulls out all the creative stops but ultimately must reach into his own childhood to discover the truth about the ghosts that haunt Travers and finally earn her trust.

The film's cast includes Academy Award winners Tom Hanks and Emma Thompson as Walt Disney and P.L. Travers, along with Jason Schwartzman and B.J. Novak as legendary songwriters Richard and Robert Sherman, Bradley Whitford as screenwriter Don DaGradi, Colin Farrell as a young Travers Robert Goff (P.L. Travers' father, seen in flashback sequences) and Paul Giamatti as Ralph, Travers' California driver. The film is directed by John Lee Hancock, and written by Kelly Marcel and Sue Smith.

Much of the film's screenplay pulls from actual recordings of story meetings between the *Mary Poppins* filmmakers and the visiting Travers, who insisted that the meetings be recorded. To learn more about this invaluable source material, *Disney Files* Magazine reached out to the man who helped recover and restore those "lost tapes," Grammy Award-winning Disney record producer and resident music historian Randy Thornton.

"I was the department clerk at Disneyland/Vista Records (now Walt Disney Records) back in 1987, handling master tapes and basically being a courier," Randy told us. "I'd occasionally pop one of those masters onto the tape machine, and I soon came across one labeled 'Mary Poppins Pre Demo.' When I played it, I heard two guys singing songs I'd never heard before, only to discover that it was a Sherman brothers demo recording of songs that never made it into the film."

Randy's discovery, coupled with additional story-meeting tapes given to him by Disney Legend Richard Sherman (who had labeled his tapes "The Poppins Trials"), led to the tapes' restoration and, decades later, gave filmmakers a wealth of material from which to craft their story for *Saving Mr. Banks*.

"To be in a position to help further share the story of the Sherman brothers, who have given so much joy to the world and to me personally, is an incredible honor," said Randy, who also met with Jason Schwartzman as the actor prepared for his portrayal of Richard Sherman. "I have a career because of these geniuses."

Among the Members most excited for the release of *Saving Mr. Banks* are those who sailed aboard the Sept. 29-Oct. 3 Member Cruise, which included a special inside look at the production.

The Walt Disney Family Museum

Where more than history meets the eye

To many of us, museums have a reputation of being stodgy places where things are pretty hands-off and people speak in hushed tones. However, as anyone who has enjoyed a visit to the Walt Disney Family Museum in San Francisco can attest, that's not the case in this very special destination for both the casual Disney fan and the hardcore enthusiast. To say the place is "animated," very interactive and has a story around almost every corner would be a tremendous understatement! Come with me now as I share with you a few of my favorite aspects of this extraordinary museum.



Your Jaw Drops Before You Even Get in the Building

As a history buff, I'm in awe of the beautifully restored U.S. military barracks building (dating back to 1890) that is home to the museum, located in the Presidio of San Francisco. However, the museum's historic location also comes with a postcard-perfect view of the famed Golden Gate Bridge.

Walt's Private Laughing Place

Just inside the lobby behind the reception desk you will find this little vignette that captures the charm of Walt Disney's private apartment above the Fire Station on Main Street, U.S.A. at Disneyland Park in Anaheim, Calif. These are original furnishings and items from the apartment, including a framed photo of Walt's parents, Elias and Flora.



A Most Unique Academy Award

Also in the lobby is just a small sampling of the more than 900 awards and honors Walt Disney received throughout his career.

A standout among the honors is perhaps the most unique Academy Award ever created - one large Oscar statuette and seven little ones for, you guessed it, Walt Disney's production of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs in 1937.





Disneyland Like You've Never Seen It Before

One of the true highlights of a visit to the museum is an incredibly detailed, fully articulated 12-foot model of the Disneyland of Walt's imagination. The model is a visual "Wow!" and depicts almost every aspect of Disneyland that Walt Disney ever imagined, including attractions such as "Space Port and Rocket Flight," which we know today as Space Mountain.



You Never Know Who Might Drop In

The museum features a terrific array of special events, many attended by notable Disney Legends, authors and artists. Perhaps most importantly, the museum is utilized as an invaluable research facility. In doing research for his role as Walt Disney in the upcoming film Saving Mr. Banks, Academy Award-winning actor Tom Hanks stopped by to discuss the film with the museum's co-founder and Walt Disney's daughter, Diane Disney Miller.

Mary Poppins refuses to explain herself, much like Ms. Pamela Lyndon Travers, who wrote the *Mary Poppins* stories that inspired Disney's beloved film of the same name.

The author adamantly claimed that she didn't "create" the title character but merely told her extraordinary story. When asked about any of Mary Poppins' activities beyond those shared in print, for example, Ms. Travers wouldn't (or, as she put it, couldn't) answer, saying that the mysterious nanny hadn't provided such details.

Similarly shrouded are details of the author's testy relationship with Walt Disney, a tantalizing tale that has Disney fans buzzing about the new film *Saving Mr. Banks*. Opening in U.S. theaters on Dec. 20, the highly anticipated film offers a revealing take on the behind-the-scenes saga, with Academy Award-winners Tom Hanks and Emma Thompson starring as Walt Disney and P.L. Travers. (Learn more about the film on page 24.)

The excitement surrounding both Saving Mr. Banks and the 50th anniversary Disney Blu-ray Disc debut of the original Mary Poppins (also set for December), inspired me to dig deep into my editorial carpet bag to find some fun facts you may not know about the landmark 1964 film. And, in tribute to the legendary songwriting Sherman brothers who famously expanded our vocabularies with made-up words like "Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious," I present each fact with a made-up word of my own.

Voiceatility: Inspired by an actual umbrella carried by a maid during P.L. Travers' childhood, the film's iconic parrot-head umbrella spoke with the versatile voice of actor David Tomlinson, who aside from portraying Mr. Banks in the film, also voiced a variety of animated characters in the "Jolly Holiday" sequence, including a penguin and the jockey who lets Mary Poppins pass to win the race.

Cockneyish: Actor Dick Van Dyke's uniquely individual interpretation of the Cockney accent for his performance as Bert resulted in part from the instruction of voice coach J. Pat O'Malley, an actor of Irish descent.

Known for playing the butler in Disney's "Spin and Marty" television serials on the original "Mickey Mouse Club," O'Malley had voiced several Disney-animated characters, including Mr. Toad's horse, Cyril Proudbottom, in 1949's *The Adventures of Ichabod and Mr. Toad*, and the Colonel and Jasper in 1961's *One Hundred and One Dalmatians*. (He later returned to the mic to voice Colonel Hathi in 1967's *The Jungle Book*.)

The Irishman's Cockney coaching gave the Bert character an accent more Cockney-ish than pure Cockney, as noted by star Julie Andrews in response to a letter from P.L. Travers as the author "checked in" on the production.

Andrews reportedly wrote that Dick Van Dyke was, "grand as Bert and quite winning. His Cockney was really not too bad. He would be an 'individual' Cockney, instead of a 'regular type' Cockney."



Darwellian: If you've ever sailed with Disney Legend Richard Sherman on a Member Cruise (as Members did once again this September), you probably know that "Feed the Birds" was Walt Disney's favorite song, and that Walt often called

the Sherman brothers up to his office to play the tune at the end of a rough day.

You may even know that "Feed the Birds" was the first song written for the production and the last scene filmed. But do you know the story of the scene's star?

Walt Disney felt that retired, 83-year-old Academy Award-winner Jane Darwell was ideal for the role of the Bird Lady, and he convinced her to perform this one last role by promising it would only take a day and that she'd be made comfortable. Crews even cut a hole into the steps of the St. Paul's Cathedral set and filled it with pillows so the actress wouldn't have to sit on a hard surface. Walt personally supervised the single-day filming of this scene.

This casting decision was one of many questioned by P. L. Travers, who envisioned English actress Margaret Rutherford in the role as part of her preferred all-English cast.

By the way, as I know Disney Vacation Club Members are big travelers, it's important to note that feeding the birds at the real St. Paul's Cathedral is now illegal.

Recyclarobin: Speaking of birds, the two Audio-Animatronic robins seen in the film went on to appear in the Carousel of Progress attraction at the 1964-65 New York World's Fair – just weeks after their shoot. Julie Andrews voiced the birds' whistling in the film.

Horsification. Now speaking of carousels (how's that for two perfect segues in a row?), the beautiful carousel horses used in the "Jolly Holliday" sequence were created by Disney Legend Blaine Gibson, known to many Disney fans as the visionary behind the look of everything from Audio-Animatronic presidents to the much-photographed "Partners" statue of Walt Disney and Mickey Mouse. Gibson designed the horses' faces as caricatures of the actors riding them. Check out Dick Van Dyke's horse with its prominent chin and smile.

Walt Disney World Guests almost had the opportunity to ride through their own Jolly Holiday, as Walt Disney Imagineers once planned a Fantasyland attraction that would've taken Guests through Bert's chalk paintings aboard similarly styled carousel horses. The attraction would've sat where Guests report today to fly to Neverland, and an alternate Mary Poppins

attraction concept would've used a ride system very similar to the one you love at Peter Pan's Flight. The concept called for umbrella vehicles to hang from the track to fly Guests over London. Roy O. Disney reportedly nixed those plans, feeling that East Coast Guests would want some of the same attraction experiences loved by Disneyland Guests in California.

Alternacast: Mary Poppins could've been a different film had Walt landed on alternate casting choices. Among the stars considered for leading roles were Cary Grant, Danny Kaye, Fred Astaire and Anthony Newley for Bert; Bette Davis, Mary Martin and Angela Lansbury for Mary Poppins; and Terry Thomas, David Niven, James Mason and George Sanders for Mr. Banks.

Reflectivosity: Was Mary Poppins vain? Tough to say, but try counting how many times she checks herself out in a mirror during the film.

Winigreement: Unhappy with the first name that the Disney story team came up with for Mrs. Banks, P.L. Travers reportedly offered up a list of 11 acceptable names. Walt agreed to "Winifred."

Stepintime: (Okay, so this one's less of a made-up word and more of a clear nod to one of my favorite *Mary Poppins* songs. Seemed like an appropriate way to end my little Sherman brothers gimmick.) At the beginning of the film, Mr. Banks sings, "It's grand to be an Englishman in 1910, King Edward's on the throne." As King Edward VII died in May 1910, one can conclude that the film is set sometime during the first four months of that year. The original books were set in 1930s, Depression-era England, and it was the Sherman Brothers who suggested the grand "step in time" to a happier, timeless era of elegance.




